IF there is one thing that **by BRIAN** musicians from all walks of life have in common be they amateur or international stars – it's that they'll always be prepared to support your charity fundraising effort by donating their musical services for a good cause.

A few weeks ago whilst chomping on a burger in Bridgnorth, I bumped into Blackheath lad Alan Morley, former drummer Walsall's 1960s with Decca recording artists. Black Country circuit The Redcaps and later, of Kidderminster's Chicken Shack.

Alan enthused over his latest musical venture with Bridgnorth group The Bradeney Bunch. The group comprises six mature members fronted by Wolverhampton-born and bred Carole Westwood - a popular local along with his wife Jane singer on the jazz music circuit.

"Our stock-in-trade is predominately charity fundraising events for which we have performed loads of gigs throughout Shropshire over the past three years," says Les, "mainly at care homes throughout the county, but also pubs and open air festivals. We are now seeking to break out into the starting with our first gig in the area at Mary Stevens Park, Stourbridge on Saturday 14 September. It's for a charity called The Little Princess Trust who support children with

hair loss as a consequence of cancer treatment." I interviewed Les at his place of work, Bradeney House in Worfield, which is just outside Bridgnorth. He runs the care home and a team of dedicated care staff.

Les is a most personable character who looks rock star, and he exudes about his work and his

musical fundraising.

Les started to learn the guitar about eight years ago when he was fifty three, initially taking lessons from Bob Kev in Wolverhampton, and even taking his guitar on holiday to to maintain his practice.

First gigs

Four years ago he was collared by the Activities Manager at Bradeney House bemoaning the fact that she was having a 'disastrous time' trying to raise money for the residents' comfort fund, and put it to Les: "It's about bloody time you played that guitar to raise some money!"

This was a spur for Les, who enrolled a few members of staff, and The Bradeney Bunch was formed. It was to be his as the sole founder mem- trio of jazz musicians, very first foray into live gigging and soon his fundraising ventures were yielding incomes of four figures with ease. The Activities Manager was well pleased! "I know only too well

the power of music," said Les. "Music also acts as reminiscence therapy for long term memory loss. We had a resident with dementia, but he knew the lyrics to all The Beatles' songs we played and would sing along with the group, word perfect. He sort of came alive!"

Pop groups have a regular churn of personnel and The Bradeney Bunch are no exception. Four years ago every member was a Bradenev House

employee, at the time of writing only Les remains lands. She, along with her

opened the 2019 Bridgnorth Jazz Festival and proved so popular that they were immediately booked to headline the 2020 festival. After once sharing a stage with jazz luminary Humphrey Lyttelton in Wolverhampton he later said of her on his BBC radio programme as he introduced her album, "having a good voice quality, good range, ability to take a song and make it right, she deserves a place in the top rank of contemporary singers."

Carole was voted Shrewsbury Jazz Singer of the Year in 2005 and has won top prize in the Birmingham Music Awards Jazz/Blues category.

Bassist and guitar collector Paul Dunbar is originally from London's East End where he played with a number of local groups during the late sixties/early seventies. Upon moving to the West Midlands in the eighties he played with Alan Morley, in Texas Flood, Crawling Kingsnakes and Fablon Five. In recent times he was a member of Worcester groups The Lazy Sundays, Barrelhouse Blues Band and Big Fat Shorty.

Lead guitarist Roger **Wall** was originally with Cheltenham cult band One Over 237 who played to packed houses across the UK in the style of **AC**/ DC and ZZ Top.

Roger lived and played in Germany for a while performing with an acoustic-style group who went on to travel through Iran, frequently opened for acts a call on 01746 716686.
